ONE NATION TWO IDEALS

An appalling display of incompetence, as described by the EB, the Lok Sabha's failure to negotiate a resolution has escalated an already dire situation. As Hindu-Muslim tensions rage on the Ganga, which was once a symbol of purity, is on the brink of an ecological collapse. Through the proceedings of this session, the delegates of the futuristic Lok Sabha have proven themselves wholly incapable of steering the nation towards stability.

The emergency session demanded responses to the alarming rise in Ganga's acidity as the escalating communal violence across North India was purposed to provide a platform for solutions. Instead, chaos ensued within the walls of the Sansad Bhavan escalating into blame-shifting and ideological posturing. The tragic irony is that while the nation stands on the precipice of a humanitarian and environmental disaster, its elected leaders have chosen to engage in petty squabbles, fixating on bickering, rather than act decisively.

The Times of India tragedy, where four Hindu employees were killed in an attack on the editor's office, should have incentivized the delegates into swift action. Yet, the response was muddled, with debates over freedom of the press overshadowing the urgent need to quell the violence. The BJP's proposal to ban the newspaper nationwide was met with derision, yet no alternative solutions were offered, leaving the situation to fester.

On the other hand, the demands from both Hindu and Muslim communities were met with equal disdain and dismissiveness. Calls for apologies, reparations, and even the destruction of religious sites were bandied about with little regard for the broader implications. Ignoring any form of dialogue, the session became a battleground of insults and accusations, with the delegates seemingly more interested in scoring political points than in resolving the crisis at hand.

Rahul Gandhi's explanation of the disagreement of his partner Imran Masood as a mere "auditory hindrance" was emblematic of the complete disconnect between the severity of the situation and the delegates' actions. The question posed to Rahul Gandhi about his ability to handle pressure was not just rhetorical; it underscored the frustration felt by many who watched as the Lok Sabha fumbled its way through a session that should have been marked by decisive leadership.

This committee miserably failed to address the strikes by Muslim labourers, which have crippled the sewage treatment plants across North India. This serves as perhaps the most glaring example of the Lok Sabha's incompetence. With over 12 lakh workers on strike and the Ganga's pollution levels skyrocketing, the delegates offered little more than platitudes. The closure of these vital facilities, including Asia's largest STP in Lucknow, threatens not only the health of the river but the livelihoods of millions who depend on its waters for agriculture.

The involvement of religious leaders, who should have been voices of reason, let their emotions get the best of them as the arrival of Adhiraaj Shankar and other prominent figures at Parliament added fuel to the fire, their demands for retribution and their refusal to compromise mirrored the inflexibility of the MPs themselves.

As we stand on the brink of a national crisis, the incompetence displayed by our delegates cannot be overstated. Their inability to negotiate, their ditsregard for the well-being of the nation, and their willingness to let the situation spiral out of control is a damning indictment of their leadership. If the Lok Sabha cannot rise to the occasion and provide the governance that this nation so desperately needs, then we must question whether they are fit to lead at all.

The people of India deserve better. They deserve leaders who can navigate through such challenges with mutual respect and dialogue. Unfortunately, what we witnessed today was a far cry from that ideal. The Lok Sabha has failed us, and the consequences of their failure may be felt for generations to come.

Tensions Surge at CMUN 2024's Historic Security Council

Events of an enthralling night crisis – the most exciting one at CMUN 2024- have led to a distinct divide among countries at the Historic Security Council. Countries have gravitated to one of two blocs: those supporting Serbia and those supporting the Muslim Bosniaks.

At the night crisis, the separation of co-delegates led to a risky choice being made. A few nations were forced to side with the Black Hand, a Serbian extremist group, leading to the formation of these two distinct blocs.

The two blocs stand face to face with each other, ready for their verbal combat. An open floor is in order. Accusations of terrorism, genocide, extremism, and selfish intentions are shouted from both sides. The Bosnian War, a tragic issue characterized by bitter fighting, genocide, ethnic cleansing and systematic abuse against the Bosnian Muslims and Bosnian Croats, is reduced to a mere war of words, a small smattering of insults and accusations. So much being said, yet so few attempts at solution.

Then begins the cascade of crisis updates which sends the Security Council into a frenzy, increasing dramatic tension and raising the stakes for all countries involved. The Head of Bosnian War military reports that there will be an organized missile strike on Serbia, as a "last ditch attempt to stop Black Hand's sinister plan, and to regain some kind of control over this spiraling catastrophe." Those in support of the Bosniakserupt in applause and satisfaction, but a twist is revealed. With funding from France, Russia and China, Serbia has been building SeaRAMs and Iron domes. The USA and Bosnia's allies shake their heads in disappointment, but the bitter truth remains that people in Bosnia are still suffering, and so little is being done about it.

Consequent crisis updates of the US's humanitarian aid to Bosnia turning out to be military, and the spreading of the virus h-influenza type B in the Balkan States by Malaysia, add fire to an already heated debate. Countries try to propose solutions, but tension and apprehension is too high. Will the Security Council be able to reach a consensus? And for how long will the innocent continue to suffer?

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

INTERVIEW WITH SENATOR JOSEPH MONTOYA, The United States Senate


Interviewer: Senator, some have accused you and other officials as using this entire situation just as an opportunity to gain some leverage politically. How do you respond to these accusations?
Our party was committed to justice. We wish to simply understand the reality of the situation, and believe that it is essential to keep our governments accountable.
Interviewer: It has been argued that your support for the Democratic Party majorly influenced your activities during the Watergate investigation. How do you respond to allegations that you prioritised party interests over the pursuit of justice?
The fundamental thing that we as the Democratic party declared in committee is that when Sam Ervin was declared dead when he posed liberal thoughts and ideas, was wrongly interpreted by the Republicans. We as the Democratic Party support and obviously look forward to liberal thoughts, which influenced our decisions in committee.
Interviewer: As the investigation continued, it became evident that high-level officials were involved in concealing the Watergate break-in. Given the gravity of the matter, why didn't the committee act more quickly and publicly to hold these officials accountable?
As soon as it became clear that multiple high-level official was involved in this scandal, we attempted to act immediately and to gather information and verify it before proceeding directly
Interviewer: Was it a deliberate strategy to avoid direct confrontation with the White House unless absolutely necessary?
When something starts of, the entire network of everyone involved is very complex. With that comes deceit. We thus had to be very cautious in your attempt to gauge who has guilty or no We wanted everything to be fair, and were obviously not looking forward to anyone perjuring themselves.

India in Crisis: Circulation of 10,000 CR Worth of Counterfeit Money

The destabilised Indian economy continues to suffer fatal blows, now with 10,000 crores worth of counterfeit currency notes in circulation, instigated by their very own banks. The import and export ban on grain and humanitarian aid proposes additional difficulty on external help. While China planned to help the Indian economy revitalise and recover, that goal, at present, seems beyond the scope of horizon.

Facing wealth disparity and utter poverty for the majority of the population, it is obvious that the free market is an enterprise difficult to manage in a country such as India. The lack of government interference hampers the image of the model of India as socio-capitalist and endangers the social fabric of the nation by creating desperation amongst the people. The Home Ministers Affair, Mr. Amit Shah was allegedly kidnapped by the Bharatiya Mazdoor Sangh, while the president, Ms Draupadi Murmu removed and the position taken over by the Executive Board. The BJP government seems to be fragmenting bit by bit, with Amit Shah and foreign affairs minister, S. Jaishankar publicly berating the Prime Minister, Mr Narendra Modi, calling for the creation of an interim government.

Xinhua was able to contact the CEO of NITI Aayog, India's policy making body, Mr BVR Subrahmanyam to get an insight on the inner workings of the current crisis at hand. "The NITI Aayog is working with the clean officials of thegovernment to return the country to normalcy as soon as possible," stated Mr Subrahmanyam, continuing on to state, "The Torrents' means do not justify the ends and we strongly oppose the extremist approach taken by them. While the founder of Torrents, HMS, as a working-class union believes they are working for the people, however, in action they have caused hyperinflation and become complicit in degrading human rights." China strongly opposes the rise of such insurgent groups against public peace and social order and expresses its concerns over getting back on track with the bilateral economic relations shared between the two sovereign nations, supporting the current government.
